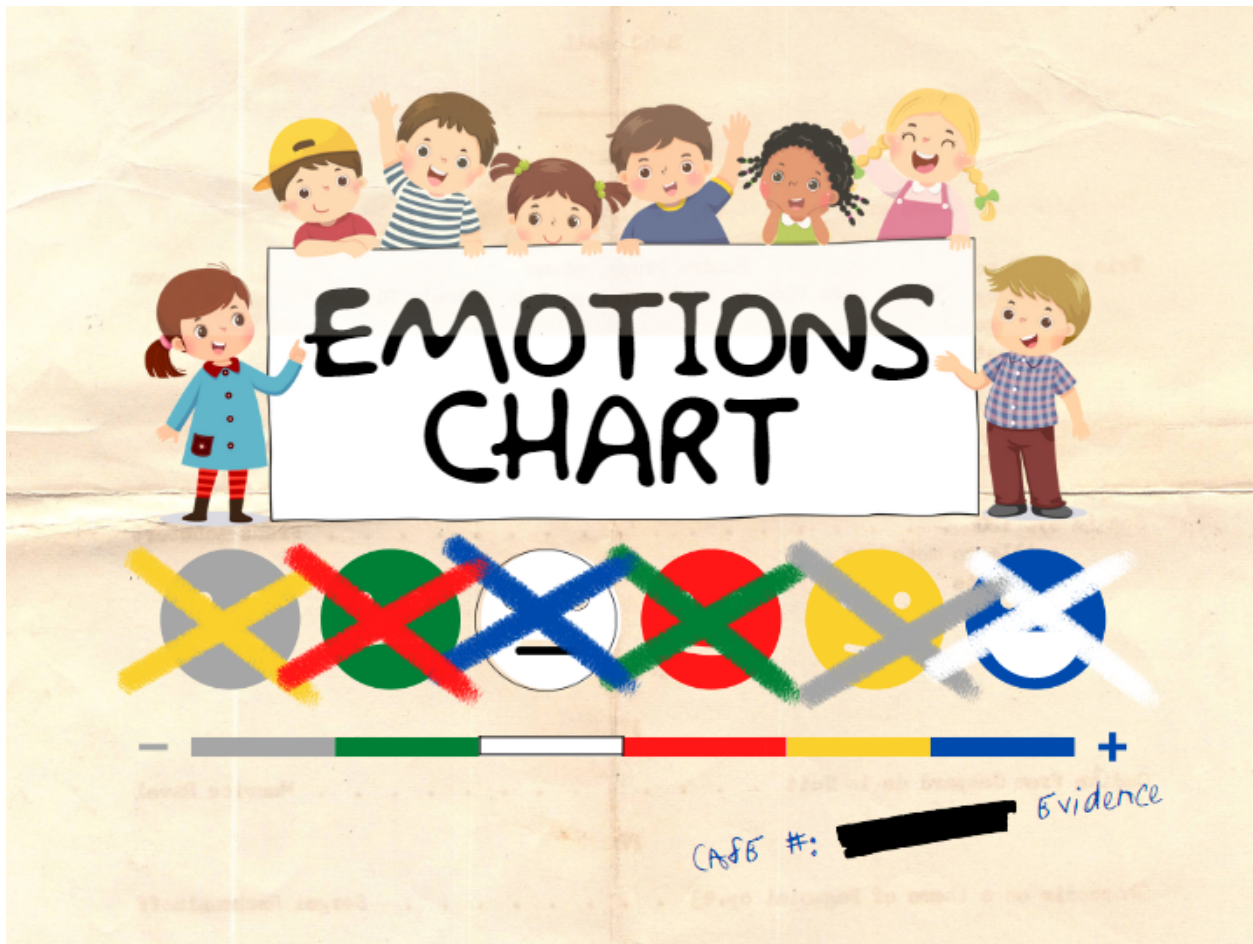


Snowbound Micro Hint File

*One Puzzle Per Page

Emotions Chart / Coded Message

1. You will need the colored notes from the Snowbound Box in order to work this.
2. The coded message uses characters similar to the ones found on the colored notes but the alphabet is not in the correct order. You will need to determine the new order of the colored notes in order to read the message.
3. The Emotions Chart gives you the clue needed to re-order the colored notes. If a face is crossed out, swap that with the color of the X. The first one will be yellow and the fifth will be gray.



What is the Case Number? Unlock

1. You will need to have decrypted the coded message on the back of the Emotions Chart before attempting this.
2. The coded message gives you the case number.

List of Not/And Words

1. You will need to have solved the “What is the Case Number” Unlock before attempting this.
2. Inside the case is a document from the victim detailing his thoughts on John Felix. At the bottom of the sheet is a list of words, that line up with the list of “not words”.
3. Once you have them lined up, you will need to determine the letter(s) each line is trying to give you. For the first one it says “Big not Bug” - all the letters are the same except “I” so the first letter is “I”. Continue this for each line until you have the full message. Note: Some lines say “not” and some say “and,” meaning you will use some differences and some similarities.

What is the Name of the Poem?

Unlock

1. You will need to have solved the list of “Not Words” before attempting this.

Poem

1. You will need to use the sheet of letters and numbers to solve this.
2. The sheet of letters and numbers are used along with the poem to form a line/letter puzzle.
3. The “L” means line and the number immediately following is the line number. The number after the period is the letter. So the first one, “L4.4” means the fourth line, the fourth letter which is “I”.

Solved all the Puzzles? Unlock

1. You will need to have solved all of the other puzzles before attempting this.
2. The message you pull from the poem line/letter will give you the motive for the murder.
